

ANNUAL REPORT 1989 RUTLAND REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

This past year has, again, been challenging and active for the Regional Commission as communities in the Rutland Region begin to work with Act 200.

The Regional Planning Commission is dedicated to working with communities to ensure that Act 200 is used cooperatively and positively. With this focus the Commission believes it will be possible for communities to develop local plans that provide strong local control while recognizing regional responsibilities.

During the past year the Regional Planning Commission:

- successfully assisted nine regional communities to obtain special planning funds to inventory natural areas in their communities. This information will be very important as local plans are prepared;


ANNUAL REPORT — 1989 RUTLAND COUNTY SOLID WASTE DISTRICT

Rutland County Solid Waste District continues to outpace any other District in completing the long range planning required under Vermont's Act 78, the recently passed solid waste legislation. We have completed waste generation studies and analysis of residual disposal alternatives. During the coming year we will complete an analysis of recycling and composting alternatives that are designed to complement landfills and incineration.

The major component of our solid waste strategy that was implemented this year was recycling. Almost every transfer station participated in the newly created recycling program for transfer stations. Most towns now have the familiar "white box" with the holes in the sides for glass and cans and similar boxes for newsprint and cardboard. In Rutland City and Proctor, we are now running a curbside pickup program where residents are asked to place their recyclables at the curb once a week. Next year we will concentrate on implementation of household hazardous waste and appliance programs.

Of course, the District must still make sure that there is a disposal system in place for that trash which isn't recycled. With the closing of Vicon last year and the loss of Brandon and Thetford disposal sites, we have been forced to look out of state for disposal at much higher expense. We have also opened a regional transfer station in Rutland City to assist small haulers and some smaller towns in transporting their trash to New Hampshire. We will continue to look for short term "fixes" as we work towards a long term answer.

The District has been given the task of managing all garbage within the 25 towns that make up the District. We will endeavor to meet both the letter and spirit of Vermont's solid waste legislation so as to provide for a safer environment. Furthermore, we will continue to meet the challenge of finding short term disposal options in the face of mounting obstacles. We ask everyone to assist us by participating in recycling and other solid waste activities, by becoming aware of the difficulties we face in solving our garbage problems and by accepting the responsibility for finding solutions.

Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. has provided emergency and non-emergency ambulance service since July 1983. During our sixth fiscal year, ending June 30, 1989, Regional Ambulance Service, Inc., responded to a total of 3,736 calls.

The cost of providing ambulance service to the Town of Clarendon and the other 10 member towns increases each year. The increased costs are not being passed on to the towns, but are being funded from other sources. We have been able to contain the request for assessment amount for the fifth continuous year. SOUTHWESTERN VERMONT AREA AGENCY ON AGING Report to the Citizens of Clarendon

In fiscal year 1989, the Southwestern Vermont Area Agency on Aging served 97 residents of Clarendon with our meals program, senior advocate and other services. There were 2646 Meals on Wheels delivered to 22 homebound persons in Clarendon. Meals on Wheels are vital to many persons and help them to remain in their own homes. 1141 meals were served to residents of Clarendon in the Grange Hall. 42 Clarendon residents participated in that program. Senior Advocates assisted 33 Clarendon residents with a variety of services including applications and problem resolution in benefit programs such as Medicaid, Foodstamps and SSI. Advocate staff also helped elders who had questions or problems related to health care payments, insurance claims, Vermont tax rebate claims and energy assistance.

The agency estimates that it will spend \$28,805 to assist seniors in Clarendon in Fiscal year 1990. Last year the town contributed \$1000 toward the program costs. We are thankful for your help. State and federal funds, as well as participant donations made up the balance. \$6191 in meal donations were received from seniors in Clarendon for congregate and home delivered meals. Services of our agency are available to anyone aged 60 or older. III. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

A. Enrollment

The table above illustrates the enrollment trends of the past several years. The 1989-90 elementary school enrollment is down slightly and we do not anticipate any big increases for next year. The number of Clarendon students attending Mill River is also down. We expect these numbers to increase next year as a small group of seniors is replaced by a larger group of seventh graders. In the case of both schools, numbers can and do change quickly as families move in and out of town. Frequent changes are a regular occurrence.

B. Personnel

All school personnel, teachers and other staff members, are listed on page one of this report. New members for the 1989-90 school year include: Sheila Gruber, grade 1; Janice McCoy, grade 5; Marie Welch, supplemental reading; Daniel Graves, part-time music; Paula Bliss, physical education; and Stanley Bizon, custodian. We welcome these new staff members and wish them success in their new positions.

C. Curriculum

Curriculum and staff development continue under the leadership of Robert Snarski, principal, and Shayne Lylis, RSSU Director of Curriculum and Staff Development. Curriculum guides have been completed in many subject areas and are near completion in others. In conjunction with these guides assessment instruments are being developed to monitor student performance. We commend Mr. Snarski and Ms. Lylis for their leadership and the teachers for the many hours they have devoted to committee work and attendance at workshops.

D. School Facilities

The new addition to the Clarendon Elementary School was completed during the summer of 1989 and opened to students and staff with the beginning of the new school year in September. This new addition provided much needed space in the form of new classrooms, a new music room, an art/science room, a resource room, additional administrative space and storage space. The total project came in well under budget, approximately \$200,000.00. This constitutes a savings of approximately \$140,000.00 to the school district and \$60,000.00 to the state in construction aid. On August 1, 1989 the voters approved using these funds to purchase additional land adjacent to the school. The school board is in the process of completing this purchase. The voters of Clarendon are to be commended for their strong support for their schools.

E. Budget and School Taxes

The 1990-91 proposed school budget is contained within the financial statements of this report. Proposed expenditures are \$1,495,102.00 for the operation of the elementary school, with \$391,789.00 to be raised by taxes. A major portion of the increase in expenditures, \$122,522.00, is attributed to special education costs, which are discussed in greater detail under section "G" of this report. Discounting special education cost increases, the net increase in the expenditure budget is less than 5%. The budget figure for state aid is an estimate, as no definite information is available at this time.

F. Assessment of Student Performance

Student performance is measured in a variety of ways including: teacher made tests; criterion referenced tests; standardized norm referenced tests; and through portfolios of student work. The norm referenced test gives a picture of student progress as compared to a national sample. For the 1988-89 school year students were tested with the Stanford Achievement Series. Clarendon students scored above the national sample for all grades, except grade 1, in the basic battery which is a composite of the reading, language arts and mathematics test scores. A mathematics skill test is administered to all students in grades 3, 5, and 7 on an annual basis. These results are used to improve both the curriculum and teaching methods. Also, samples of student writing are collected and reviewed on an annual basis to help evaluate student progress in this area.

CLARENDON TOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT (Cont.)

G. Special Education

The Rutland South Supervisory Union administers special education programs for the students of Clarendon, Shrewsbury and Wallingford. These programs are in compliance with P.L. 94-142 and support the goals of providing full educational opportunities for all handicapped youngsters. Under recently enacted state legislation these programs are funded jointly by local and state funds which are sent to the supervisory union and then subgranted to the local district. These new procedures have necessitated changes in local budget procedures. For budget year 1988-89 gross special education expenditures and revenue appeared in the supervisory union budget; local budgets contained only net expenditures for the district. Beginning with budget year 1989-90 gross expenditures will appear in the local budget along with revenue subgranted from the state through RSSU.

H. Chapter I Program

The Rutland South Supervisory Union administers the Federally funded, Chapter I Program which serves eligible students in Clarendon through two programs. The first program provides remedial reading instruction to schoolaged youngsters. The second is a small, home based, preschool program serving eligible four-year olds. Shirley Bingham coordinates and supervises these programs. Shirley Loomis and Theresa Jakubowski provide remedial reading instruction and Jan Tofferi works with parents and students in the preschool. J. Salary Schedules

The Clarendon teacher salary schedule for the 1989-90 school year has a base salary of \$17,600 for a beginning teacher with a Bachelors Degree. Increments of \$600 are paid for advanced training and additional years of teaching experience. A teacher with 30 credit hours beyond a Masters Degree and with 19 years of experience can earn the maximum salary of \$32,000. The average salary for Clarendon teachers is \$25,042 for 1989-90. This compares with an average teacher salary for the state of Vermont of \$28,849.
