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"WEATHER 101" WITH AL!

Fall is here and now in full swing. A lot of leaves have now fallen due to recent heavy rains and gusty winds. With the sun now lower in the sky, we will see the air continue to get colder with shorter days and longer nights. Sunsets will become much earlier as Daylight Savings time ended at 2 AM Sunday November 6.

October temperatures ran a few degrees below normal while precipitation was somewhat above normal. We are still in a drought but the recent episodes of heavy rain in October have helped somewhat. We are now in the last month of hurricane season as it will end on November 30. We can still see some mild/warm weather in November, however with the time of year it does not last very long. We will see some warmer weather during the first five days of the month.

The reason for this warmer weather is the southeast US upper level high pressure system which will build northward up the east coast. This will push the jet stream to our north putting us on the south side or warmer side. Temperatures will reach the 60's and possibly low 70's on one of two days.

This warm weather will not last long as a long wave through (upper level disturbance) will bring a cold front through before we get into the first weekend in November. This will trend to much cooler temperatures. We can also see coastal storms during the month of November. Some can produce snow even before Thanksgiving. This is not a prediction for this year. However, we have had snowstorms before Thanksgiving in the past. With the ocean temperatures still fairly mild and the land areas much colder, this can lead to storm development in November.

If a storm develops, the question then becomes where does it track and how intense will it become. Also the speed how fast the storm moves effects how much precipitation we get. Usually our coastal storms develop off the east coast or can even form over the Gulf coastal states.

If a coastal storm forms off the east coast to our south, then the question becomes the track. If the storm tracks near or south of Cape Cod this will put us on the cold side of the storm and would result in more snow versus rain. If the storm tracks to our west then we would be on the east side of the low pressure which is the warmer side.


With a westward track our winds would be more east/southeast and this would bring warmer air in from the ocean. A lot of times during the winter there will be a low pressure system over the Ohio Valley/ Great

Lakes.

The energy from this low pressure is transferred to a secondary low pressure off the east coast. This secondary development is caused by the temperature differences between the warmer ocean and colder land. If this secondary low becomes stronger than the primary low to the west we can see a larger impact storm. When a low pressure system forms in the Gulf of Mexico this storm can be one to have a large impact on our weather. These storms get a lot of energy (warmth from the Gulf of Mexico ocean waters). The question becomes where does this storm track.

When a low pressure system forms in the Gulf of Mexico we look to see if the northern and southern jet streams will PHASE (joining together). If they phase, this storm will track close to Cape Cod & the Islands to possibly give us a major storm. If the jet streams do not phase, then this storm will track too far to the south to give us a major storm. In this case the storm will most likely track close enough to give the Mid-Atlantic region, the Washington DC area a major snowstorm with a miss for us. So you can see that whether the two jet streams phase or not determines how far north a coastal storm will track. How much phasing will occur this winter? This is a difficult question which myself and other meteorologists cannot answer at this time. Time will tell. One big factor we look at during the winter is the high pressure system in Greenland, known as the Greenland high. How much of a factor will this high have this winter? This is also a difficult question to answer at this time. The effects of the Greenland high is to keep the jet stream to our south and this can cause cold weather to become locked into our region causing more snow versus rain for winter storms. Time will tell how much of a factor this Greenland high will have on our weather this winter. First it has to form and this is also difficult to tell when it will occur at this time. Stay tuned next month as we look at the weather that occurs this month and we will also have an outlook on what the winter weather may bring.

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
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

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Gr. Lawrence Tech Students Start Opioid Prevention Task Force

Inspired by Methuen's Phil Lahey, students at the Greater Lawrence Tech School have started a Drug Education Task Force. Lahey, a former Methuen Councilor and the main force in the Merrimack Valley to spearhead public discussions and educational forums for families of drug dependent individuals, says he believes having high school kids involved in solving the opioid crisis is critical.

"It all started when I spoke to one of the teachers here at the GLTS, Cheryl Lewis. I spoke to her class and a group of students said they wanted to get involved. After I spoke, six of the students decided they want to start their own task force for prevention and abuse of opioids. So, the best way to start, they said, was at the open house this month for 7th and 8th graders who are coming to check out the school. I'm very excited because I deal with parents and recovering addicts; these kids are tough they are tough to reach but it's easier with kids reaching out too."

Dorangely Rojas, a GLTS 12th grade student from Lawrence told The Valley

Patriot that she wanted to get involved to make a difference in the community. "The schools weren't giving us enough information on the dangers of opioids and the opioid epidemic, so I thought it was important to join the task force and have a positive affect on our community," she said.

Dorangely said that working with Phil Lahey's task force and starting a drug prevention program for local kids with an after school program will show them the price you pay to be on these kind of drugs and what it does to them as well as their families and their community. Everyone knows someone who has gone through this, so anyone can be affected, it's very dangerous."

Carla Barla a GLTS senior from Lawrence said that what made her want to get involved in the task force was to help poor people who are addicted.

"Being part of this makes me feel better about helping people. Together we can help reduce the amount of overdoses and opioid use and abuse."

Over 70 community members attended the event, where loved ones shared their stories of how addiction has impacted their lives and held a candlelight vigil to commemorate the memory of loved ones.

On Saturday, Sept. 24th, the Merrimack Valley Prevention and Substance Abuse Project (MVPASAP) held their third annual Community Forum at the Timony Grammar School (45 Pleasant View St.). The event featured speakers and presentations focusing on prevention, educa-

tion and advocacy, where the Methuen C.A.R.E.S team put up a table to provide resources and outreach and the department provided refreshments. Over 150 people attended the event.

On Sunday, Sept. 25th, the C.A.R.E.S team hosted their first "Recovery Walk" at The Loop (90 Pleasant Valley St.). Co-hosted by The Loop, the event included live bands, games, and guest speakers. In addition, vendors and community organizations provided resources and education to those with loved ones suffering from the disease of addiction. Over 200 community members participated in the walk.

"The City of Methuen came together this weekend to tackle the disease affecting our community and loved ones in many different ways," Mayor Zanni said. "Through a collaboration of various community organizations, hundreds of residents received support, education, and resources to help fight both the disease and stigma surrounding addiction."

"We are not only fighting to keep drugs off our streets, but also fighting to end the stigma surrounding drug addiction," Chief Solomon said. Censorship Radio, 980WCAP Silences Conservative Talk

"They should rename WCAP to WDNC, for 'Democrat National Committee' because that is what the station has become." ~ John MacDonald

Conservative radio hosts John MacDonald and Tom Duggan have both been harassed and pushed out of 980WCAP for their conservative views.

Conservative radio talk show host John MacDonald walked out of his show, live, on the air Tuesday morning, after the 980WCAP radio station owner, Sam Poulten, "invaded" the program to 'redirect' the on-air conversation about Hillary Clinton's emails and give the Clinton party line on what the host was discussing with his guest, Republican, Mary Burns.

"Hold on we have been invaded," MacDonald said on the air as the station owner barged into the studio during the discussion. MacDonald is a self-described conservative Democrat.

Poulten not only hijacked the show to eat up MacDonald's paid airtime, but he stayed for the duration of the show causing an on-air disagreement, and eventually MacDonald walking out, leaving his guest Mary Burns to bear the brunt of Poulten's manipulative rants.

Poulten demanded that talk show hosts on the station not talk about Hillary Clinton's emails or other "controversies".

"I walked out because my First Amendment right of free speech was being violated," MacDonald told The Valley Patriot in an exclusive interview after the show.

"It is extremely troubling that a veteran like Sam Poulten would be so quick to trample on the First Amendment rights he

and his fellow vets fought and died for."

AN EQUAL TIME DOCTRINE?

During the on-air melee, Poulten also misrepresented FCC regulations, claiming that MacDonald had violated the "Equal Time Doctrine" by having Republican State Rep. candidate Helen Brady (14 Middlesex District) on the air, but not Poulten's candidate, Democratic Rep. Cory Atkins. Poulten has campaigned for Atkins in the past and has called her "a close friend" on the air on several occasions.

But, the "Equal Time Doctrine" for radio has not existed since President Ronald Reagan did away with it in the 1980s.

Poulten later admitted that he didn't want candidates on talk shows 30 days prior to the election because he wanted them to pay money for the airtime, leaving MacDonald to ask "is this freedom of speech?" before finally storming out of the station. "I pay for the time," MacDonald said. "He has no right to tell a brokered program host who can and cannot be on the air."

Ironically, all of this took place just minutes after a discussion on the First Amendment, where MacDonald pointed out how the national media was censoring news and commentary to slant publicity in favor of Hillary Clinton.

Station owner Sam Poulten is a member of the Massachusetts Democratic State Committee, is campaigning for Hillary



What to Expect From a Trump Administration

With all the media lies and misrepresentations about Donald Trump before the election, it's hard to know what was real and what was just made-up, anti-Trump hysteria. So, what will Donald Trump do as president? ON IMMIGRATION

ABORTION AND THE SUPREME COURT - We really don't know what Trump will do with a Supreme Court pick now that he has actually won the election. If he keeps his word, he will appoint strict

constitutionalist judges who will apply the constitution as written and intended by those who wrote it. That means justices appointed by Trump will most likely overturn *Roe vs. Wade*, the Supreme Court case that declared the right of abortion on demand up to birth as a constitutional right. When

that happens, the question of abortion will be left up to each state as the constitution initially intended.

As for federal funding of abortion, Trump says he will stop it and he probably will, including defunding the abortion industry's biggest abortion mill, Planned Parenthood.

Rivera Halts Construction on Merrimack St. Project, Also Halts Columbia Gas Work

Lawrence Mayor Dan Rivera has ordered a halt of all construction on the Merrimack St. project, sending workers and police details home on Wednesday. Rivera also called for a work stoppage by Columbia Gas Company throughout the city.

Rivera told The Valley Patriot in an exclusive interview Thursday, that he called for the work stoppage on Merrimack St. after the contractor refused to communicate with the city or work with the abutters of the construction project.

"This contractor wants to fix city streets and conduct business without any consideration of the people who live and work there," Rivera said.

Rivera "So, basically the contractor on the Merrimack St. project was doing whatever they wanted to do without talking to us. They were pushing out some of the staff on our team and not communicating with us about how they were doing things. The abutters were very upset at what they were doing."

"For example, last Friday I found out on

my own that they made a decision, without telling anyone, that they were shutting down South Union and Merrimack Streets for a half-day on Monday. That's unacceptable. That's an intersection right by the bridge that is being shut down and none of the businesses or residents, much less the city, was told about. They were going to tell us the night before. I think we owe it to the people this project is inconveniencing to have open lines of communication and letting the people in on what's being done over there."

Rivera says that when he called the contractor to get them to work with the city and communicate what they were going to do before they do it, "They hung up on me," Rivera said in frustration, admitting he was harsh with them on the phone.

"I asked them, do you know how much money we are paying you on this project? The next thing I know they hung up."

Rivera says he would rather see the roads blocked and work done at night or on weekends when it will have the least

impact on businesses and traffic. "They can't communicate with us or take our concerns seriously, so, I did the only thing I thought would get their attention and I shut it down."

The project is set to restart next week after proper notice is given to abutters and those affected by the closures of South Union and Merrimack Streets near the Duck Bridge.

COLUMBIA GAS IN HOT... PAVING?

Another move made by the Lawrence mayor this week was to order Columbia Gas to stop working on city streets for 30 days. "They were digging up newly paved streets; we've been over this with them. They get the permits to do the work long before a street is to be paved, but they wait till after the street is paved, and then rip up the streets to do their work. I've told them they have to do the work on newly paved streets before they are paved."

"I have a new rule. If the hot top is black you don't rip it up unless it's an emergency, and if it's an emergency we need to be

notified right away. The hot top only stays black for about 2 years. When you rip up a new street you cause numerous long term problems with potholes, plowing, the time and aggravation of the DPW, etc. You also have to re-pave the street sooner than you would if it wasn't ripped up. I have been fighting this stuff every day of my life. At its core, government is incompetent. I'm trying to change that every day in Lawrence. There's no reason they can't do their work before a street is paved."

Rivera says that he does not blame the subcontractors actually performing the work, but the president of Columbia Gas who is not communicating the wishes of the city to the subcontractors.

"They think they can just do whatever they want, and I'm kind of tired of it. People already think the city doesn't know what it's doing, and here we pay millions of dollars for newly paved streets, and then pay millions more to re-pave it and repair potholes because it was ripped up with no consideration for the city."

TOM DUGGAN'S NOTEBOOK

VALLEY LAWMAKERS GET A PASS ELECTION - Several Merrimack Valley lawmakers ran with no opposition at all this year. It is pathetic that ANY lawmaker would run unopposed in any election, but even more pathetic in a presidential year. I know, I know, if you ask any elected official who runs unopposed, they will all say the same thing, "if nobody opposes you, that means the people like the job you are doing".

CAMPBELL VS TORESSI

Linda Dean Campbell (D) of Methuen had no problem getting reelected after reports of her opponent's criminal record came to light. Still, Campbell worked hard and campaigned to the end even though her victory was a foregone conclusion.

L'ITALIEN VS. LAPLANTE

State Senator Barbara L'Italien (D) was reelected after defeating Sue LaPlante (R) in all four of the communities in her district: Lawrence, Andover, Tewksbury, and Dracut. L'Italien will serve another two year term and will come up for reelection again in 2018.

KELCOURSE VS. SULLIVAN

Amesbury State Representative Jim Kelcourse (R) won a second term representing Amesbury, Salisbury, and Newburyport. With so many partisan Democrats in his district, many in the Democrat party thought he was ripe to be picked off with Hillary Clinton at the top of the ticket.



Changing Sewer-User Fees Rejected By Town Meeting

At Annual Town Meeting, Article 18 (Sewer User Fees charged by Actual Metered Water Method) the Selectmen/ Sewer Commissioners voted against the interests of the single families, seniors and those who conserve water in the Town of Salisbury.

According to them, it is perfectly fair for the Town of Salisbury to charge senior citizens \$480 a year (for 20,000 gallons of water) to use the sewer and "flush the toilet". They also think it is fair to charge a family of 5 (who might use over 60,000 gallons of water) the same \$480 a year.

By their vote, the Selectmen showed a bias against a "certain" group of minorities in favor of a "cash cow" for the Sewer Enterprise Fund. They did this by overcharging single family households, those who conserve, senior citizens, small families, small businesses and seasonal properties.

The US EPA recommends estimating average much less. If a household uses less than 60,000 gallons per year, they are overcharged because the town uses the flat fee method (currently \$480 year per unit).

Kevin Henderson (of the Warrant Advisory Board) spoke at the meeting and incorrectly lead people to believe that the issue being discussed was charging seasonal vs. year round users.

In order for a fair and equitable system of charging for sewer use, each user should be billed by the wastewater processed according to each users water.

Sewer user fees are paid by choice for use of sewer system - it is not a tax.

Selectman, Chuck Takesian said he was in favor of 'actual water' method and that the selectmen will be "studying" this. As a side note: the Town has been "studying" this since 1990. That's 26 YEARS.

For Valley Patriot readers who remember the September, 2016 story "Harrington

Softens" on sewer usage - he appears to have changed his mind since facing Salisbury Citizens for Change. When Manager Harrington had a chance to follow with what he said at that meeting, he did exactly as his critics predicted, and he hardened his stance on the issue. Years of complaints by town residents about the way Salisbury charges for sewer user fees have fallen on deaf ears once again.

At the actual Town Meeting, Town Manager Neil Harrington incorrectly claimed that the vote that night was to change the "rate", adding that only the selectmen can determine the rate. This, despite the warrant article clearly spelling out that the "rate" was used to determine the bill for each user based on their actual water usage.

Town Counsel Thomas McEnaney also mentioned the "rate" was determined by the selectmen and based on his "opinion" of the statute.

Gracemarie Tomaselli, the petitioner of the warrant article, read Massachusetts General Laws to the voters: "...but the charge shall be assessed in a fair and equitable manner". Both McEnaney and Harrington refused to address the correction of their previous statements.

During the discussion several people left Town Meeting under the impression that the issue was not going to be voted on.

Tomaselli then explained that way the town charges now is the same as having four people going to dinner where one person has lobster, and everyone else has hamburger, but the guy who had lobster wants to split the bill evenly.

The vote was 77 against the article, 75 in favor. While members of Town meeting called for a recount, Town Moderator Jerry Klima rushed to adjourn the meeting.

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

Things We All Learned From The Justo Garcia Trial

Secondly, when politicians argue for a path to citizenship for illegal immigrants and say "Of course we will make them learn English," they're lying. Mr. Garcia needed an interpreter for his trial and testified that he only knows one or two words in English, yet he also testified that he took English classes and became an American citizen.

The only time we hear from councilors about the importance of learning and speaking English is when the Community Development Block Grants are awarded. Then many local non profits get money for teaching ESL classes because "learning English is so important." Other times, when there are five people in a row that can't speak English testifying at a public hearing, the councilors that love handing out the money just smile and shake their heads in a condescending manner.

The last thing I learned was that people waiting for trial move around a lot. Mr. Garcia testified at his October trial that he lived in West Bridgewater. He must have just moved there since he voted in Lawrence this September. I'll bet he's moved back to Lawrence in time for the November 8th election and then, who knows where he'll be "living" until election time rolls around again.

Information regarding Mr. Garcia's testimony was taken from the tweets of Jill Harmaciniski of The Eagle-Tribune.

In other news, at the first council meeting of October the position of homeless coordinator was approved. Councilor Maldonado again made it clear that although we welcome illegal immigrants, homeless Americans from other towns ARE NOT welcome here.

During the discussion of this matter, Councilor Alvarez-Rodriguez remarked that many people receiving rental assistance in Lawrence go through other cities housing authorities, causing Lawrence to lose out on the income from administration.

I mention this for two reasons.

First, the subject under discussion was the ordinance creating the homeless coordinator position, not any housing authority. Discussion is supposed to be limited to the item at hand. Untold time is wasted at council meetings going off on a tangent. This erodes the transparency of government.

Second, I spoke to a person who has



experience with both the Methuen and Lawrence Housing Authorities. They said that the Methuen Housing Authority is just better than its counterpart in Lawrence, giving more complete information about housing opportunities in the entire area whereas Lawrence was more Lawrence oriented. Also, in Lawrence, newly arrived immigrants are placed at the top of the list, leaving the rest of the applicants with a longer wait. That's why they went through Methuen.

It seems that with early voting, the campaign laws don't apply. Generally electioneering is not allowed within 150 ft of an entrance to a polling location. When Dave Abdo was running for mayor against Lantigua my husband had a large Abdo sign on his truck. He was not allowed to park within 150 ft of entrances to City Hall during the absentee voting period because City Hall was a polling location.

There appear to be no such laws regarding early voting. Candidates and their surrogates hover around the building's entrance to talk to people. This will be a disaster during city elections. You won't be able to visit City Hall without running a gauntlet of candidates. This is a terrible idea.

I heard that Susan Laplante, the Republican candidate for State Senate, was trying to film outside City Hall one day and supporters of her rival Barbara L'Italien acted like imbeciles and bullies trying to disrupt the shoot. Ahh, the party of tolerance.

A relative of a certain city councilor may be running for a council seat of their own. During the summer I saw a change in this person's behavior on social media and have been waiting to hear rumors. Now I have. We do not need the council to be a family affair.

2017-2018 Legislative Session: Expanding Land Conservation

Leading up to the beginning of a new formal legislative session in January, I'm focusing in on which bills will be priorities for me to file, re-file and co-sponsor. My column over these next months will be focused on a number of those bills.

This month's column is focused on a bill I co-sponsored last session—House Bill 2585, "An Act Relative To Land Conservation Incentives," filed by Representative Stephen Kulik, which would expand the state's Conservation Land Tax Credit Program by increasing the state's cap from \$2 million to \$5 million a year.

Massachusetts created the Conservation Land Tax Credit Program in 2011 with the goal of increasing the donation of property by landowners for conservation purposes. Under the program, land donations must be made to governmental entities such as municipalities, or private conservation corporations such as non-profit organizations, that have the resources necessary to provide stewardship of the conserved lands. These properties must contain an important natural resource such as forestland, drinking water assets, and sensitive natural habitats. In exchange for eligible properties, landowners are provided a tax credit valued at 50% of their land's value. The individual tax credit is capped at a maximum \$75,000 per donation, while the state-wide limit for the program overall is limited to \$2 million per year.

Since 2011, the program has helped preserve over 10,000 acres of land in Massachusetts. Between 2011 and 2016, the state received land donations valued at over \$46.3 million at a cost of \$10.7 million in tax credits, representing a significant return on investment. However, there are currently more than 87 applications for land transfers under the program awaiting state approval, representing \$5 million in state tax credits, and encompassing 3,500 acres, including over 100 acres of land in the Merrimack Valley.

Increasing the current \$2 million annual cap to \$5 million would address the existing waitlist of landowners whom have applied under the program, and also encourage greater conservation planning in the future.

As many as 14 states in the region have some kind of land conservation tax credit programs, including New York and Connecticut. Many of these states' programs also have much larger caps, or no annual caps or other restrictions, to prevent residents from participating in the state's conservation goals. This allows residents to have more freedom to do what they think is



best for the future of their land parcels.

Expansion of the tax credit is a wise investment because preserved open space, rich in natural resources, has many public benefits which cannot be replicated once that land is permanently developed. These benefits include expanded outdoor recreational opportunities for local residents, curbed municipal costs related to suburban sprawl, preservation of rural character in communities, protection of drinking water resources, maintained farmland for food production, and the conservation of wildlife habitat.

Current zoning laws have resulted in more and more outward development beyond urban areas, threatening open spaces. In fact, the U.S. Forest Service recently named the Merrimack River watershed as the most threatened in the nation due to the loss of surrounding forest acreage, which would typically filter polluted runoff from more-populated areas before water reaches the river. Over 600,000 residents in the Merrimack Valley draw their water from the Merrimack, including the City of Methuen. Changing zoning laws at the state and municipal level can be a time-consuming and often lengthy process. However, expansion of this tax credit program is a straightforward and expeditious tool to address conservation goals zoning often strives to address.

Moreover, Massachusetts currently maintains many other types of more expensive tax credit programs, where the benefits are much more speculative and less directly helpful to the public interest. Let's raise the cap on the state's Conservation Land Tax Credit Program.

If this is an initiative you too support, your advocacy for this bill to be a state priority will make a real difference in making this proposal a reality.

To offer man a second chance, the King of the universe took on a human nature in the Incarnation to stamp out the power of the serpent, something the first Adam should have done. When He began His reign, Christ the King proclaimed to the world, "The Kingdom of God is at hand, repent and believe in the good news!" (Mk 1:15).

What is this good news? That God exists, that He has not forgotten us, that He is infinite Love, and will temper justice with His mercy to reestablish His kingdom. In John's gospel Christ proclaimed, "The ruler of this world...has no power over me" (Jn 14:30). He assures us, "I have conquered the world" (Jn 16:33), and invites all people of every race, nation, and era to follow Him in this victory: "If you remain in my word you will be my disciples, and you will know the truth and the truth will set you free" (Jn 8:32). Yet, as he said to Pontius Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world" (Jn 18:36). It is in the world but not of the world. This is the essence of our hope: Christ reminds humanity that God's kingship, which was lost for countless centuries due to man's rejection in original sin, is now re-established over the human race. No longer must we be slaves to our fears, vices, and addictions;

nor to hatred, envy, or greed. No, God's reign frees us from all that, leaving no need for denial.

For the time being, however, His kingdom exists concurrently with the temporal kingdoms of the world. While our culture at large behaves like a stubborn adolescent in denial foolishly declaring independence from God, we now have a choice between life and death, truth and falsehood, love and hate which masquerades as love by "tolerating" evil. Christ the King declared, "For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice" (Jn 18:37). Yet, we deny the truth about ourselves because it might mean self-sacrifice. We embrace a culture of death because we reject the natural order of sexual love - which is marriage, sexual intimacy, and babies in that order - three elements of an integral whole not to be separated or impeded. We hold grudges and condemn individuals rather than love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us (Mt 5:44). We ignore the poor and vulnerable, we abort one-third of our children before birth, we pretend that sodomitic couplings are marriage, and we insist on using each other as objects - as long as there is 'consent'. The reign of Satan is going wild because he knows his time is running out.

Yet, we cannot lose hope and must persevere, witnessing to the Truth in love. The King counsels, "Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna" (Mt 10:28). Indeed, despite the spirit of this election cycle and its results, we cannot forget that the King of heaven seeks to heal our wounds, elevate our lives, and offer us unimaginable happiness that is everlasting. Christ the King, who is omniscient and omnipotent, will at the perfect time bring about the fullness of what has already begun, when St. John's vision comes to complete fruition:

"Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race...He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away...The one who sat on the throne said, 'Behold, I make all things new'" (Rev 21:4-5).

980WCAP and is paid for his services with free airtime.

When Duggan called out LeBlanc for saying all the "poor people in Lawrence love being poor", he says he was told by the station owner that he wasn't allowed to talk about LeBlanc.

"I spent two hours a week on the air doing my show, and 20 hours a week fielding harassing phone calls and emails from Sam complaining about every single thing I had said during my show. I couldn't get any work done on the paper because I was constantly dealing with Sam Poulten and Bob LeBlanc" Duggan added.

"Even when I was a call-in guest on other programs he would text the hosts and tell them to hang up on me the minute I said something 'too conservative' or mentioned the bad behavior of Bob LeBlanc attacking Latinos in Lawrence."

"Now, my show was a brokered show which means John and I effectively pay for the time. That means the broker (host) of the show owns that air-time as if it was a commercial. The station owner is to have no say in what is or is not discussed. THAT is what we were paying for. But, we never got what we paid for because of censorship and interference by the station owner and his lackey Bob LeBlanc" Dug-

gan said.

PROTECTING DEMOCRATS

Duggan went on to say that for years he had seen news stories get cut because it didn't espouse the Democratic Party line. "He runs the station as though it is an arm of the Democratic Party while trying to give the appearance that that is not what's going on. But, that is exactly what is going on."

"The last straw for me was when he told me I couldn't talk badly about Senator Elizabeth Warren because Warren had gotten his son a job at Comedy Central writing for the 'Nightly Show with Larry Wilmore'. Within a few days, I tried to break a story about Lowell School Committeeman Steve Gendron's son being involved in a racist incident at Lowell High School. Again, I was told that I was not allowed to talk about an elected official because Poulten supports Gendron and they are close friends."

"This is the state of talk radio and free speech in this country, my friends," Duggan concluded. "The voice of conservatives like myself and John MacDonald are being silenced and the public needs to know why."

Are you obsessed with your scale as much as I am?

For years my scale and I had a mutual agreement, it would stay in that quiet empty corner in the bathroom ignored and if I didn't bother with it, it wouldn't bother with me.

All that changed at the beginning of my journey back on February 6, 2015 when I had to weigh in for a starting weight and that's where everything about our relationship forever changed. Of course that initial weigh in was traumatic (for both me and the scale), when I saw it read 415.9 lbs, I had to do all I could to restrain myself from throwing it out the window and I'm sure the scale was doing all it could to restrain from screaming: get off, get off - you're killing me!

At that point a mutual hatred began for me and that oversized bathroom doorstopper.

As I apologized to it for almost crushing it, things between us became a little less tense as I dusted it off and began stepping on it daily, watching my weight going down every day when I started the program made us both happy, but there were days that the number didn't move or said I was up and that discouraged me, thus making the day ahead for me not so fun. On days the numbers would be down we were both happy again and we had a great day. Slight changes in weight seem to affect how we feel and impact decisions that we make and it was then I started to realize very quickly that I was obsessed with that number and it ruled my daily emotions. I knew if I didn't change my way of thinking soon, I was going to need an intervention at the nearest Bed, Bath and Beyond.

Did you know that after the question: Is it a boy or a girl, it's the second question asked about us minutes after we were born; How much does he weigh? So for me, that is when I probably became obsessed with my weight, thanks labor and delivery nurse Jan for calling me a big

bouncing baby boy.

In all seriousness, don't let the scale number be the only thing that makes you feel better about yourself. Using only your weight is outdated when it comes to measurements of being healthy. As a society, we need to start taking a different approach by taking the emphasis off of what number we weigh and instead put the focus on being healthier and getting fit. As I mentioned last month when hitting your plateau, you could be building muscle and losing fat at the same time but the scale may not have moved. Chances are you will look and feel better and clothes may even feel looser, all NSV (Non Scale Victories).

I now happily made the decision to weigh myself once a month and here's why; if you are overweight and your physician has recommended that you lose some weight, whether it is 10 lbs or 100 lbs, a healthy guideline to lose weight (and better your chances at keeping it off) is to lose between one to two pounds a week and if you follow this guideline there is no reason to weigh yourself once a day to see if you lost a healthy quarter of a pound right? 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Failed Back Surgery Syndrome

Failed Back Surgery Syndrome (FBSS) refers to a group of patients who have new or persistent pain after spinal surgery for back or leg pain. The same term applies for continuing pain in the neck or arm following neck surgery.

The pain can be reduced but still present, or may get worse within a few months after surgery due to a buildup of scar tissue around spinal nerve roots, along with persistent tissue pain and muscle spasm. The term refers to a condition of continuing pain and is not meant to imply there was necessarily a problem during surgery.

Causes:

In general, there are two primary reasons chronic pain may persist after someone undergoes a major back operation.

First, for a variety of reasons, the patient may not have been a good candidate for surgery to begin with. This can be due to a misdiagnosis or a pre-surgery physical evaluation that was not thorough. Either way, if a patient is not a good candidate for spine surgery, the surgery has the potential to create new symptoms outside of the ones already experienced by the patient.

Second, the procedure may have been performed incorrectly. In the midst of the highly invasive nature of traditional open back surgery, a nerve root may be damaged or excessive blood loss may prevent the surgery from being performed with

absolute precision.

Specific causes of FBSS include:

- Surgery performed at incorrect location

- Bone graft rejection

- Fusion hardware failure

- Scar tissue compressing a nerve root

- Inadequate decompression of affected nerve or nerves

- Post-operative infection

Symptoms:

The most obvious symptom of failed back surgery syndrome is persistent, chronic pain that is not associated with the healing process. Other symptoms associated with FBSS include:

- New pain at a level different from the location treated

- Inability to recuperate

- Restricted mobility

- Sharp, stabbing back pain

- Numbness or pain radiating through the lower back into the legs

- Back spasms
- Anxiety, depression and sleeplessness
- Potential dependence on pain medication

Treatment:



After detailed physical exam and evaluation for the pain case trying to identify specific reason for the pain if possible and obtaining diagnostic studies such as spine x-rays, CT or MRI studies, the Pain Specialist will draft the best possible treatment plan based on the above findings:

Medication may be necessary to alleviate some of the patient's pain. Medications may include analgesic and anti-inflammatory medications, including non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs). Additionally, some patients may be prescribed opioids for short-term pain relief. Furthermore, certain antidepressants medications may be prescribed.

Physical therapy, chiropractic care, transcutaneous electrical nerve stimula-

tion (TENS), may also be recommended as complementary treatments for patients suffering with failed back surgery syndrome.

Epidural steroid injections, nerve blocks, and trigger point injections may also be suggested to help alleviate a patient's pain. Epidural steroid injections consist of injecting a corticosteroid, combined with a local anesthetic, into the epidural space of the affected area. Nerve blocks consist of injecting medication close to or directly into a nerve root to help block pain signals. Trigger point injections involve injecting medication directly into a trigger point to help relieve pain.

If the pain associated with failed back surgery syndrome does not respond to initial pain management therapies, spinal cord stimulation (SCS) may be recommended. This therapy involves implanting stimulating electrodes in the epidural space and implanting a small electrical pulse generator near the spine that is connected with conducting wires. These devices usually have a remote control. Spinal cord stimulation delivers small, electrical impulses to the spinal cord to help control chronic pain.

While not all therapies may provide complete relief of symptoms, physicians will help to design the best treatment plan to help eliminate as much pain as possible. A combination of treatment options usually provides the best possible treatment outcomes.




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Commitment to Patient Care Not Quite Sturdy at Sturdy Hospital

Leadership is made much of because it affects every member of an organization and everyone who has to deal with them. The impact of leadership is felt in every interaction, big or small, and in every policy that is implemented on a daily basis.

When the leadership is bad, this is immediately felt in every interaction with the hospital staff and the policies one is confronted with.

When the leadership is bad, that is revealed too by the overt reliance on fake metrics like Leapfrog Group Scores to paper over reality and distract people.

This past week I had my first experience of interacting with the system at Sturdy Memorial Hospital. Two weeks prior, I had faxed in three orders, 2 for CT scans and 1 for neck dopplers, to be done on a patient of mine who lives in Taunton and is registered with Sturdy Hospital. They have all her data.

The expectation had been that the hospital would call the patient to set up a time to come in for the scans and I would do a house call after, to see the images and discuss it with my patient.

Two weeks later my patient called me, this past Monday, to say what Tom Duggan loves to say - "Crickets!" No one had called her and the scans were never done.

So I phoned Sturdy's radiology department right away. "Oh," said the lady on the phone, "we never call the patient. That is our policy. All our doctors know that."

I informed her that I was not affiliated with Sturdy and nowhere on the hospital website was this policy mentioned.

"Well," she said, "I don't know about the website. But we never call the patient or the doctor. So we just filed your faxes."

"Well, would I be able to make an appointment for her scans now on the phone?"

"No, because you need to check her insurance and without that we will not book a slot."

"She has good insurance."

"I meant you need to check her insurance."

Impasse.....

"Perhaps you mean get a prior authorization for the scan?" I ventured.


"That's what I said. Call us back with the number."

Click.

So I called my patient's insurance plan at Blue Cross and was informed that she did not need any prior authorization for CT scans, only for MRIs.

I called the Leapfrog-awarded Sturdy Hospital back.

"I just got off the phone with Blue Cross and they said my patient never



needed a PA for CT scans."

"Well, we would not know that."

"May I have a slot now for her please?"

"What test are you ordering?"

"The same tests I faxed you two weeks ago."

"Hang on, let me find them."

She actually found them!

"Tell her to come in on Friday at 7:30 in the morning."

"Is that the earliest? She's been waiting for 2 weeks and didn't even need insurance approval."

"I said Friday at 7:30 in the morning."

Click.

Folks at other departments also informed me that they simply don't have the staff to call patients to come in for their appointments. The policy throughout is that the hospital does not call patients for anything. But their website declares "Sturdy Memorial Puts Patients First"

The really scary part? "Sturdy is capable and prepared to handle any patients with potential Ebola virus disease." says the hospital on Twitter. Good luck with epidemics Attleboro!

No wonder Sturdy Hospital needs to tout a Leapfrog Score.

You know, in the Rock & Roll lives of the stars, there are performers that started out as very young stars and didn't stop till the end, some that were put in front of the microphone and told they will be stars, and there were and are those that just got lucky.

Well, Little Eva, just happens to be one of those lucky ones. Let's start at the beginning.

Little Eva was born Eva Narcissus Boyd. Quite simply, she was called "Little" Eva, because she was named after her Aunt Eva that would visit often and be spoken of at home a lot. She was born in Belhaven, North Carolina, June 29, 1943. As a young girl, she did the church choir thing and wanted to be somebody. At the age of about seventeen, she moved to Brighton Beach, just near Brooklyn, New York, where she had other relatives. She would occasionally stand in for one of the Cookies, and do a little singing, but she also got a gig as a nanny for the song-writing team of Carol King, and Gerry Goffin.

Doing, what a nanny does, she was entertaining baby Louise, and cleaning house, but also singing, somewhat, regularly, with the Cookies, including, "Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow." Is it definitively known how the song came about? Well, not really, BUT, it is said the song had been in Goffin's head for a couple years, and Eva loved the dance crazes that were going around at the time, and danced and sang them while taking care of the baby. Did he write it for her or because of her? King and Goffin wanted Dee Dee Sharp to record it, so I guess that answers that question, but when they heard Eva singing it at home, it all came together.

Do you remember that great saxophone solo in the middle of the song? That was Artie Kaplan. He put the recording session together. Carol King wrote the arrangement and played piano for the recording. Carol and the Cookies did all the back-ground vocals while Gerry Goffin directed the whole thing. Little Eva sang the song without a glitch, like it was written for her. So, the demo was recorded.

Artie Kaplan took the demo to Camco-Parkway where they turned it down before getting even half way through it.

So, what do you do when you have a hit and nobody wants it? You start a record company, so this was the first number-one hit for Artie Kaplan's Dimension Records.

Little Eva would tour with this song, even singing it on Dick Clark's American Bandstand. This was, however, her only #1 hit. Later that year, in 1962, she would hit the top 20 with "Keep Your Hands Off My Baby." In 1963 she would also do, "Let's Turkey Trot" which would make the top 20, but after that there wasn't much. "Swinging On A Star" was a top 40 cover of a Bing Crosby song, and "Old Smokey Loco-Motion" was a top 100 song, all in 1963. She kind of fades into nothingness after those.


Little Eva never owned the rights to "The Loco-Motion" that made lots of money, just not for her. She went from a \$35.00 a week nanny to a \$50.00 a week singer. A nice raise in those days, but compared to the money made on the song, and still pulling in royalties today, she got nothing. Her 15 minutes of fame lasted from 1962 until about 1971 when she went back to North Carolina with her three children and without their father. It is said that she and her ex-husband reconciled, later.

Little Eva came out of obscurity around 1988 when Kylie Monague did a very popular cover of "The Loco-Motion". She started performing with others of her past era doing "Oldies Shows" for large audiences of aging vinyl buyers. She performed the "old stuff" with Little Richard, and Bobby Vee who just passed away a few weeks ago. She recorded "Back On Track" in 1989.

Little Eva stopped working around 2001 due to illness. She passed away in 2003 from an 18-month battle with cervical cancer. She was only 59. She is buried in a little cemetery in Belhaven, North Carolina. The burial site was refurbished in 2008 with a gravestone with an image of a steam locomotive on it with the words, "Singing With The Angels" nicely engraved on it.

Did 'The Walking Dead' Go Too Far?

The highly anticipated premiere of AMC's 'The Walking Dead' aired on October 23rd to near record ratings. Fans of the show will know that this episode promised to resolve last April's cliffhanger. That episode ended with our group of survivors being captured by Negan (Jeffrey Dean Morgan) and his followers, The Saviors. Negan was bent on revenge, after Rick (Andrew Lincoln) and his group killed some of Negan's gang. Negan felt he needed to make a point. He had the group on their knees while he wielded "Lucille," his baseball bat wrapped in barbed wire. Giving a speech to the group declaring that he was in charge now and he wasn't going to take this lying down, he swung the bat and struck one of the group on the head. We saw it in a camera shot from the point of view of the victim. The screen then faded to black and the season ended. So who did Negan kill?

We needed to wait until October to find out. Be warned, there are spoilers from here on out. If you haven't seen the premiere yet, stop reading now.

The premiere revealed that the victim was Abraham Ford (Michael Cudlitz), but he wasn't the only one. After killing Abraham, Daryl (Norman Reedus) lunged at Negan and punched him. Feeling the need to prove himself again, Negan killed one more. This time it was one of the most beloved characters of the group, Glenn Rhee (Steven Yeun). It was truly a shocking moment for fans of the show, not just in who was killed, but in the sheer brutality of the act.

The next day we heard from fans and critics that this show about zombies, that had a reputation for being the bloodiest and most gory show on television, had finally gone too far. There have been episodes in the shows history that have triggered this same feeling before, but not like this.

It wasn't just the gore that people thought was over the top. It was the way that it was presented. It was the way the show almost romanticized the killings, lingering on the shots of the bat dripping

blood. The way Negan took great pleasure in killing the two victims and asserting his dominance. Longtime fans have threatened to boycott the show. Parents groups have demanded the show be removed from the air. Children under certain ages should not be watching this show anyway. The show clearly posts warnings several times during every episode that "Parental Discretion Is Advised."

Was it brutal? Yes. Was it disturbing? Yes. Was it extremely violent? Yes. But as far as the story of 'The Walking Dead' is concerned, it was supposed to be those things. The world of this show is a zombie apocalypse, where the remaining population is struggling to survive, and rebuild their lives and societies. This is a lawless land now. For fans of the show, it is unrealistic to think that people like Negan do not exist.

Remember that Negan thinks his actions are justified. To Negan, Rick and his group are the bad guys. Negan feels his actions are appropriate and necessary for his group's survival. The same way that Rick's group consistently feels about their actions.

Moving forward, the episode was meant to solidify Negan as a villain like you've never seen on TV before. A villain whose actions will impact the story for the rest of its run.

The producers, writers, and cast of 'The Walking Dead' gave us something that is increasingly rare in today's TV landscape. An episode that made us, as fans, feel a whole series of emotions. This episode will be talked about for years to come and as a fan of the show, I agree that it was tough to watch. But in the world of 'The Walking Dead' it was a phenomenal viewing experience, one that I will not forget. THAT was what the producers were trying to accomplish. They succeeded. CJUI is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that exists to fight the ongoing anti-Semitism that runs rampant in our country specifically on our college campuses. They have brought attention to the omission of Jewish history, specifically the Holocaust, in the textbooks used in the Newton school system. They fight to educate people concerning the truth about Israel and expose those who slander and seek to destroy it as a Jewish nation.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the vast majority of hate crimes and civil rights attacks in The United States are against Jews.

Who are the ones who wish to destroy Israel and exterminate the Jews?

Predominantly those living in hostile, neighboring Muslim-dominated countries, and those who immigrate from those countries to the west. Israel is a threat to their religion and their culture because

Companion Care Services Seeks Volunteers for Vets in Nursing Homes

Alicia Nordin of Companion Care Services of New England says with more part time volunteers she would be able to service more nursing home residents, in particular, military veterans. Alicia's non-profit was established to provide companionship to seniors who may not have any family to visit them.

"We all worked in the field for so long and we know what nursing home residents experience every day. It gets harder all the time because of budget cuts and all the new regulations on nursing homes. We find ourselves spending more time on paperwork and less time with our residents."

Companion Care Services of New England cares for nursing home residents in Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

"We are looking for people to volunteer and spend time with a senior, specifically for those who don't have family or loved ones to come in and visit them," Nordin says.

"We are purposely targeting military veterans who served their country and may not have family or loved ones to visit them and keep them company. Our volunteers are here to provide companionship and fill that void. That's why our motto is: 'we are there when others can't be.'"

Nordin has a soft spot for our veterans, probably because her husband is a disabled veteran from the Air Force.

Nordin says she tries to encourage volunteers to work around their own schedule, adding that many people don't like to volunteer because they don't have a lot of time to give and don't want a big commitment. "We want people to know that you can go spend 15 or 20 minutes with nursing home residents and even that little time mean so much to the residents,



it makes them feel special."

She says some of her volunteers have a little more time and coordinate activities like book clubs, while others just do a couple of visits a week based on their availability.

"We even have a pastor who volunteers to do a bible study group and it makes such a difference," Nordin says.

Nordin and her volunteers are reaching out to civic organizations and church groups who want to reach beyond their flock and help those in need of ministry.

I am sure we will all be glad when the election is over and there are no more ads with all their biased statements. It will then be even more interesting as our next President leads us for the next four years. There will certainly be many challenges including: appointment of a Supreme Court Justice (perhaps more than one in four years); dealing with ISIS, Russia, Iran, Syria and other hot spots; cleaning up the mess in the VA and IRS; Social Security funding; Obamacare or whatever the next version becomes; what seems to be a growing racial divide and whatever else materializes.

I expect one of the big challenges will be to bring the country together again. We need leadership not only in the White House but in Congress as well. This will undoubtedly go down as one of the most bitter and nasty presidential campaigns this country has seen. Hopefully there will be recognition that a large portion of the population is tired of partisan politics in Washington, D.C.

The Air Force Association notes that the Senate is back in session on November 14th and there are only about 20 working days for Congress to finish up a handful of items before the closeout of the 114th Congress. The list includes completing the FY17 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) so Congress can send it to the White House for enactment (or veto), and supporting the appropriations bills before the continuing resolution expires on December 9th. These are complicated by the fact Congress will be in a lame duck session.

Congress is also looking forward to the FY18 NDAA and FY18 budget submission; they realize with a change in administration the budget will likely not be delivered by the first Monday in February. Depending on which party wins the White House, there could be up to a 90 day delay in starting the budget overview process (the FY10 budget, the Obama administration's first submitted budget, was delivered in May, 2009). This will of course, put pressure on completing the budget process prior to the end of FY17. Some of the issues the defense committees are still focused on include the repeal of the 2011 Budget Control Act and sequestration, acquisition reform, and ensuring appropriate funding levels for



the Department of Defense.

As citizens, our job does not end with the election. We must continue to let Congress know our thoughts on issues. Keep up the emails and calls to the district offices of our House and Senate representatives.

This month, as we celebrate Veterans Day, let us not forget those who have served in the past, but also remember the many who today wear the uniform of our nation's Armed Forces. Many are overseas and will be unable to spend Thanksgiving with their families. Many will be in harm's way. Respect and prayers are needed for all of them.

If you are a veteran and do not belong to The American Legion or other veterans organization that you might qualify for, do yourself and fellow veterans a service. JOIN! The VA needs our help and constructive criticism. The American Legion is your voice in Washington, D.C. Numbers are needed to show strength. May GOD bless our troops and their families. Bring them home safe.

VFW Announces Kick-Off of Annual \$30K Scholarship Competition

Commander Oscar Camargo of the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 2104 announced the kick-off of this year's VFW's Voice of Democracy Scholarship competition. Local high school students have the opportunity to compete for thousands of dollars in scholarships and a trip to Washington, D.C.

Students must write and record a three-to-five minute essay on the selected theme using an audio CD or flash drive and present their recording, typed essay and completed entry form to their local VFW Post by November 1. The 2016 theme selected is "My Responsibility to America." Students begin by competing at the local Post level with an entry deadline of November 1. Post winners compete at the District level with the winner advancing to the state competition.

All state first-place winners receive a four-day trip to Washington, D.C. and the chance to compete for their share of more

than \$150,000 in scholarships. The first-place winner receives a \$30,000 college scholarship.

The National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) started the Voice of Democracy Scholarship program in 1947. The VFW became a national sponsor in the late 1950s and assumed sole responsibility for the program in 1961. The competition was created to provide students grades 9-12 the opportunity to express themselves in regard to democratic ideas and principles. Around 40,000 students participate in the competition each year and VFW awards more than \$2 million in scholarships every year.

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“In The President’s Secret Service” So Much To Be Thankful For!

Ronald Kessler, a New York Times bestseller, has written books on the CIA, FBI, George W. Bush, Joseph P. Kennedy, and First Lady Laura Bush amongst others. In this book Mr. Kessler gives us an in depth history, a progression of the Secret Service, as well as a separate section listing dates important to the institution. Requirements and duties for the uniformed officers are explained. Prior assassinations and assassination attempts are reviewed.

The Secret Service should act in a confidential capacity. This book, and the agents who openly speak on the record, do not subscribe to that philosophy. Personal material makes up about half of this book.

Example: Hillary Clinton fired an agent for helping former First Lady Barbara Bush with her computer. Hillary swears like a sailor, has an explosive temper and is known for throwing things at her husband, President Bill Clinton. Almost \$200,000. worth of goods that were taken when they left the White House had to be returned. President Lyndon Johnson is credited with absconding with more than ten plane loads of White House property. He never returned anything.

Nelson Pierce, an assistant White House usher, says that Carter didn’t want the police officers or agents to look at him nor speak to him on his way into the office. President Carter refused to carry the nuclear football when he went on vacation in Plains, GA. Fifteen minutes away and in the possession of a military aide by the time the aide reached Carter the United States would have been five minutes away from total devastation.

This book is thorough, maybe a bit more than was necessary.

Equipped with its own oxygen supply, the president’s limo was armor-plated, had five inch thick bulletproof glass and eighteen inch thick doors. “The Beast” could take a direct hit from a bazooka or grenade.

The location of certain buildings and

bunkers, equipment and steps utilized in order to secure these facilities (e.g. only one metal detector inside, the nerve center is on the X floor) were specified. A secret service office under the White House was revealed, as were tunnels under the East Wing to the basement of the Treasury Department. The 440 acre training center between a conservation area and a wildlife refuge in Laurel, Maryland was noted as was the fact that the main classroom had a green roof.

On top of all this sensitive information being divulged, the Secret Services inability to stand up to political pressure put those it was sworn to protect in jeopardy. Magnetometers were routinely dispensed with in lieu of allowing the public faster access to events.

During President Obama’s 2009 White House State Dinner safety was compromised. Though not on the guest list, Michael and Tareq Salahi worked their way into this state function. No preliminary screenings, as was protocol, were done on the couple.

Another security breach occurred that evening. A man ingratiated himself with the Indian Delegation and rode with them from the hotel to the dinner. The Secret Service ignored the fact that he was also not on the guest’s lists and had not been properly vetted. The Secret Service allowed these individuals handshake access to the President and his guests.

According to this author many of this country’s assassinations have taken place in front of and some within steps of the Secret Service.

Mr. Kessler states several times in the book that the Secret Services own equipment and habits enhanced the dangers to the agents and those they protected. Poor morale was cited as one of the main failures of the organization. Management was not conducive to effectively handling and working with its agents. Pay did not keep up with inflation. Hours were horrible. Briefings were not thorough. Agents admitted they learned more about overseas threats from CNN, FOX or MSNBC than they did from their own sessions. Many agents retired. New people had to be recruited, vetted, and trained.

This book lays out all the issues with the organization. The one flaw in this book was that the same information was repeated several times. Unnecessary and ultimately annoying, the material was separated by a few chapters and then reiterated, and reiterated, and then reiterated again.

While agents’ accounts are troubling, what is more alarming is that according to many, it is only a matter of time before another assassin strikes.

A troubling though interesting read.

I do want to clarify one crucial point for your readers: Charter schools are public schools. Charter schools in Massachusetts are tuition-free, nonprofit public schools that operate outside of the traditional school district. <http://www.doe.mass.edu/charter/about.html>

Rather than reporting to a school committee, charter schools must report directly to the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and must show consistent results or face their charter being revoked.

Charter school boards are made up of educators, parents, nonprofit and business leaders.

Charter schools are open to any Massachusetts resident looking for a high quality educational option. Students are enrolled by a blind lottery, which any parent can put their child's name into.

Charter schools in Massachusetts have been found to be doing more than any other schools in the nation to close the achievement gap between low-income, minority students and their wealthy, white counterparts. Currently, Massachusetts has the third widest achievement gap in the country.

Today, there are over 30,000 children on waitlists for charter schools across the state, the majority of whom are stuck in chronically underperforming school districts including Lawrence, Fall River, Holyoke, and Boston. These communities have run up against the current cap and are frozen to charter growth.

A Yes vote on 2 would allow charter schools to provide a high quality public school option to families who need it the most.

Again, we thank the Valley Patriot for their endorsement and encourage your readers to join us in voting Yes on Question 2 on November 8th.
