## MINUTES OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 2, 1965

The annual meeting of the legal voters of the Town of Clarendon, Vt., held in Clarendon Town Hall at 10:00 A.M. on March 2, 1965 was called to order by the Moderator, Amherst Weeks. The Warning was read and business transacted as follows:

- Art. 1. Moderator—Nominated Amherst Weeks and Paul Shedd.  
Ballot necessary. 107 votes cast.  
Amherst Weeks 67—Paul Shedd 40.  
Amherst Weeks elected.
- Art. 2. Motion made, carried and accepted that the Town Report be accepted.
- Art. 3. Motion made, seconded and carried that one Road Commissioner be elected by the people.
- Art. 4. Town Officers.
- Town Clerk**—by acclamation, Mary H. Pratt.
  - Town Treasurer**—by acclamation, Mary H. Pratt.
  - Selectman**—By ballot, 132 votes cast.  
Nominated Reginald Wilson and Philip Pinkowski.  
Reginald Wilson 73; Philip Pinkowski 54.  
Reginald Wilson elected for a three year term.
  - Road Commissioner**—by ballot.  
Carl Lanfear nominated. Town Clerk instructed to cast one vote for Carl Lanfear. So done.  
Carl Lanfear elected for one year.
  - Overseer**—by ballot, 132 votes cast.  
Nominated George Holden and Bernard Burke.  
George Holden 83; Bernard Burke 48.
  - Lister**—by ballot. Milton Squier nominated. The Town Clerk directed to cast one ballot for Milton Squier. Milton Squier elected Lister for term of Three Years. George Ridlon's resignation as Lister read and accepted. Nominated to fill his unexpired term Ralph Bristol, William Herrick and George Squier. Ballot necessary, 118 votes cast. Ralph Bristol 73; George Squier 14; William Herrick 31; Ralph Bristol elected for one year.

expense.
  - Art. 11. License for malt and vinous beverages be granted.

  - Art. 12. Spirituous liquors be sold in Town.  
Yes 82—No 14

- Art. 13. Motion made, seconded and carried by acclamation that  
the Town vote a tax of \$1.00 on the dollar of the Grand  
List as the Town share of the cost of building Alfrecha  
Bridge.
- Art. 14. Motion made, seconded and carried that the Selectmen  
be authorized to buy a new truck.
- Art. 15. Land for a municipal Forest. Article laid on the table.
- Art. 16. Motions made for tax rates for the General Account of  
\$3.00, \$3.25 and \$3.50, the first two not to include the  
\$1.00 voted for Alfrecha Bridge. \$3.50 to include the  
bridge tax.  
A tax of \$3.25 was voted to pay expense of General  
Account.
- Art. 17. Motion made, seconded and carried that a tax of \$7.15  
be voted to pay current expense for the Town Schools.
- Art. 18. Australian Ballot. Article laid on the table—Selectmen  
to call a special Town Meeting within sixty days.
- Art. 19. William Bowen thanked the Town Fire Company for  
their help in the recent fire at his home.  
Made a motion that the Fire Company be allowed to use  
the Town Hall free of charge.  
Motion carried.  
Motion that an itemized account of Town expense be  
posted in the Town Hall on Town Meeting Day.  
Mr. Shedd spoke about Fire extinguishers. The Fire  
Company has some for sale.  
Alan Ridlon thanked the people of the Town for help  
they have given the Fire Company.  
Meeting adjourned.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

At the first meeting of the Selectmen of the Town of Clarendon, held on March 4, 1965, with all Selectmen present, Percy Teer was appointed Chairman of the Board and Mary Pratt, Clerk.

The following officers were appointed:

Fence Viewers—Richard Pratt, Russell Powers and Henry Potter.

Pound Keeper—Bernard Burke and Isadore LaVictoire.

Weigher of Coal—John H. Pratt.

Inspector of Wood, Shingles, etc.—Howard Pierce.

Health Officer—David Miller.

Fire Warden—William Lind.

Tree Warden—William Lind—Later William Lind refused—  
No one appointed.

The Health Officer and Fire Warden are appointed by the State upon the recommendation of the Selectmen for terms of three years.

Willard Squier was recommended to the State to fill the office of Justice of the Peace left vacant by the death of Leon Moulton.

A new General Motors truck was purchased in June for \$5,815. The money for said purchase was borrowed from Proctor Trust Company and paid in November with interest of \$65.64. One old truck was sold for \$50.00.

A special Town Meeting was held on April 19, 1965 at 7:30 P.M., the purpose of the meeting to decide if the Town of Clarendon should use the Australian Ballot System in voting for Town Officers. The minutes and results of that meeting will be found in your Town Report.

Justices of the Peace elected at the Fall General Election were Leland Congdon, Irene Hill, Joseph Raiche, George Ridlon and Willard Squier appointed by the Governor.

Because of complaints about the Wallingford Dump, located in this Town, made to Towns of Wallingford and Clarendon, officials of Wallingford have agreed to move the place where rubbish is dumped farther back away from the road and cover it, thus ending burning of rubbish and resulting smoke nuisance.

The application for a new bridge on the Alfrecha road has been accepted by the State. Said bridge will probably be built during the summer of 1966. The cost to the Town will be slightly more than anticipated, amounting to about \$13,000.00 instead of \$9,000.00 as previously estimated.

The Selectmen, with John Durkee, District Road Commissioner and Town Road Commissioner, Carl Lanfear, inspected Town roads deciding on work to be done and approximate cost of same. This work has been completed as far as possible within the limits of the amounts of money voted for same.

In October the total 1965 School Tax, \$63,171.68 was paid into the School Account. Later that month the sum of \$53,000.00 was borrowed by the General from the School and a note payable on demand without interest was given for same. Also in October notes for \$75,000.00 were paid and in the first part of November the note for the new truck, \$5,815.00, was paid. Later in November \$15,000.00 was borrowed from Proctor Trust Company. \$4,800.00 has been paid on the School Note.

The Listers began the special appraisal of Town property in August. They worked with a State Appraiser for two weeks and have continued alone since—are now about one third done—cost up to January 1, 1966 \$502.19—remaining in the Listers' Account \$353.64. Listers' Account voted 10c on the Grand List for that year, 1964, amounting to \$855.83. Since the first of the year bills have been paid amounting to \$353.64 which more than uses the amount voted. The Listers and Selectmen are requesting that you vote more money for the Listers' Account in order that they may complete the work started which they feel you will find in the end quite rewarding. The Selectmen recommend 40c on the \$1.00 of the Grand List.

The Fernet dump in East Clarendon has been closed by order of the State.

We, the Selectmen of your Town, submit this report to you, the people of Clarendon, hoping that it will meet with your approval.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Directors and Citizens of Clarendon:

I submit my thirteenth report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The Clarendon Schools opened on Wednesday, September 8, 1965, with a first day enrollment of 158 pupils, the same number as last year.

Once again, there was only one change in the faculty of your schools. Mrs. Edith Fish did not return to teach and Miss Katherine Dennis of Clarendon was employed to fill that lower grade position.

After considerable study and planning, it was decided by the School Directors to place all the eighth grade pupils in Clarendon into one classroom. Since the Flats School seemed to be the central location, the upper grade room in that building was chosen. Mrs. Lyola Mangan was assigned to this room as their teacher. Mrs. Mary Davis moved to the East School to teach the upper grades there. Also the upper grades were returned to the Chippenhook School because of the transportation plan developed. Some pupils who had previously attended the Flats School now were assigned to the Chippenhook School.

The School Directors are to be commended for their vision and willingness to make these changes. The eighth grade pupils are benefiting from this new arrangement. In the other schools, it has been possible in some instances to decrease the number of grades per teacher and this has been an improvement.

It is gratifying that Clarendon has been involved in the study now nearly completed of the possibility of forming a union high school district in the area. The suggested plans should be of interest to Clarendon and need the careful study of the citizens of the town.

Under the Elementary and Secondary Law passed by Congress, Clarendon is eligible to receive \$2,696. The School Directors have decided that these funds should be used to purchase audio-visual equipment for the schools.

For the second successive time, the School District ended its fiscal year on June 30, 1965, with a favorable balance. The total cost of operating your schools in 1964-1965 was \$81,587.74.

As we look ahead to the school year beginning on July 1, 1966, we find a new State minimum salary law which will require an increase in teachers' salaries. The next largest item in your school budget is high school tuition. This item in the budget must be increased approximately \$10,000 to meet the costs of our high school students. Rutland has raised their tuition to \$720 per pupil for next year and the school district must now pay the whole cost. The legislature changed the tuition law in 1965 and removed the \$475 maximum that the district used to pay.

The budget adopted by the School Directors for the next school year totals \$96,120.00. This will require an increase in the school tax.

For the school year 1964-1965, Clarendon showed a cost per pupil in elementary expenditures of \$323.42. For the state in districts operating elementary schools, the median cost per pupil was \$342.00.

I have appreciated working with your School Directors and teachers over the past year. The interest of the many parents who attended meetings was helpful to all.

## VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

## Montpelier, Vermont

This thirtieth in the series of annual reports submitted to the people of Clarendon presents tabulations for the calendar year 1965. In the Department of Social Welfare's program of assistance to the aged, blind or disabled 30% of the costs of hospital and physician services, as well as the excess over \$80.00 per month in Nursing Home care, are assessed against the town of settlement of the recipients of such care. Participation charges incurred by your community during the past year for each of these types of care were as follows:

Nursing Home Care	\$75.53
Hospitalization Services	\$1,011.35
Physician Services	\$177.90

Under similar settlement provisions town participation in the program of Aid to Families with Dependent Children is at the rate of one-eighth the assistance grants while costs incurred for the care of Committed Children are borne equally by the local and state agencies. Charges assessed against your community for the former amounted to \$387.15 and for the latter \$0.00 for the year just closed.

During 1965 assistance was granted to 8 residents in your community under the Aid to the Aged, Blind or Disabled program. Direct money payments to these persons were financed entirely out of state-federal funds. Among the other programs financed from these same sources were Services for the Blind, Adoption Services and Medical Aid for the Aged. While no town-by-town records are compiled for these categories, their benefits were available to all qualified residents.

### Progress Report

During the past year, your Fire Department has continued to grow.

Through the Civil Defense Organization, we were able to purchase some protective breathing equipment at a fraction of the normal cost.

Much of our effort this year after getting the last two trucks, has been directed toward getting protective clothing for the firemen. The Women's Auxiliary has again aided greatly in supplying the revenue required.

We are at the present time discussing with the surrounding Towns the establishment of Mutual Aid agreement. This will still provide fire protection for the Town.

In the little more than two years we have been organized, we have been called out thirty-five times in Clarendon and surrounding Towns, which without the protection of Clarendon Fire Department, would have cost the Town an additional \$2,500.

We are, therefore, asking the Voters for the sum of \$800 which will help cover our minimum operating expense.

It is expected that the Department will still have to rely on contributions for the revenue needed for equipment and continued progress.

- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to assess a special tax of \$8.00 on each poll in the Grand List of the Town during the taxable year of 1966 to raise money for the purpose of making payment of interest and principal on outstanding current indebtedness of the Town. (By Australian Ballot)
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to have State Auditors audit the Town Books.
- Art. 21. To see what tax the Town will vote to pay current expenses of the General Account. Recommended by the Selectmen \$3.25 besides the sum voted for the Listers.
- Art. 22. To transact any other business lawful to be done at said meeting.
